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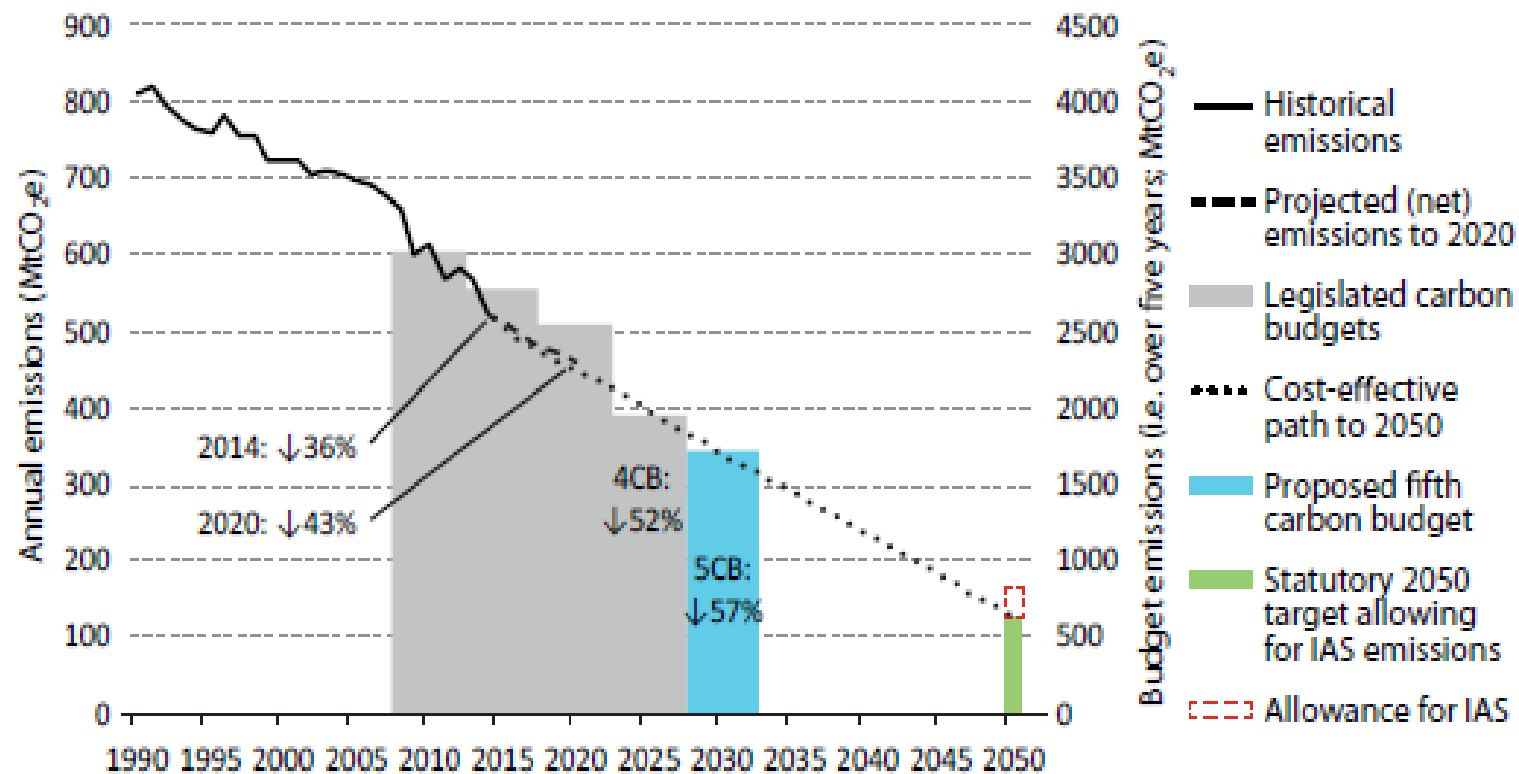

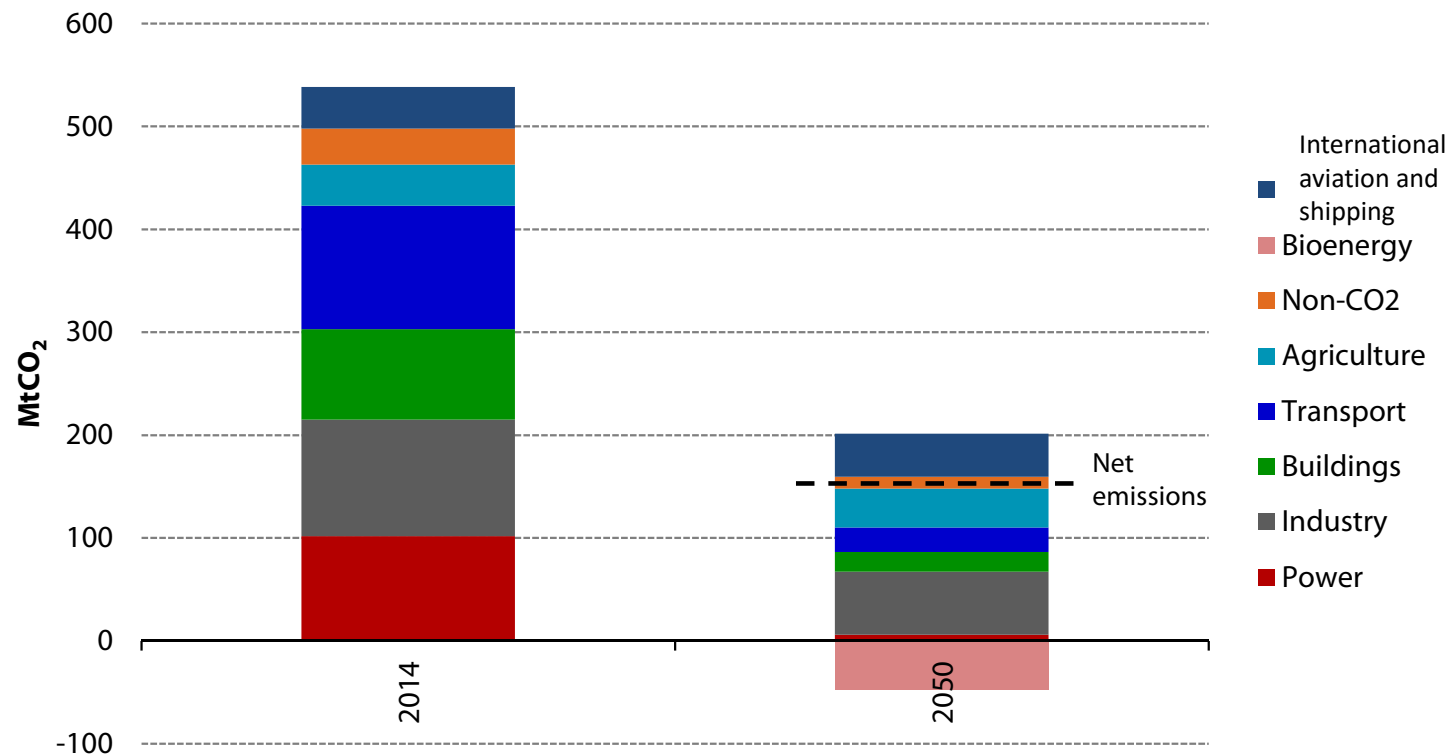

The UK should to progress at a steady pace towards the 2050 target.

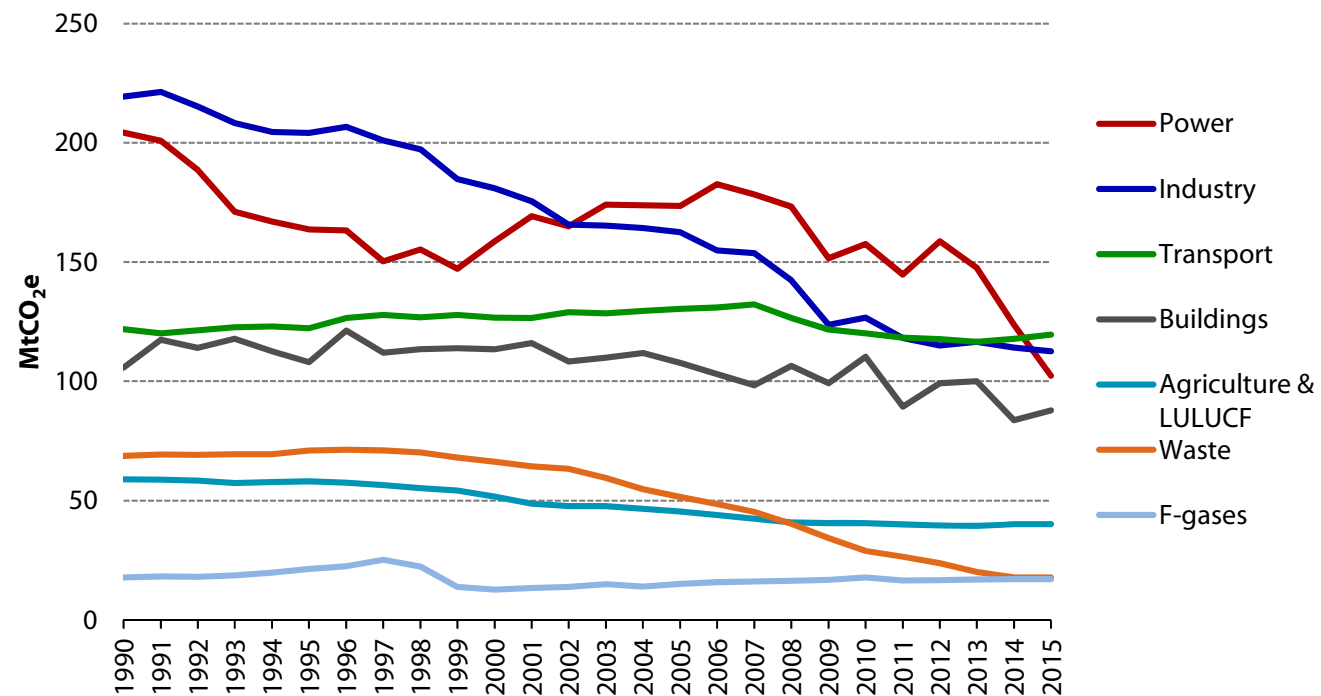


In 2050 total emissions from surface transport are most likely to be minimal.

Figure: Residual emissions in 2050 under CCC
Central scenario, including IAS.



Transport is now the biggest emitting sector



There are a range of options to reducing emissions from transport, CCC analysis suggests majority of new car sales need to be electric by 2030.

Figure: Surface transport abatement under Central scenario (2010-2030)
