
New European regulation on tyre labelling








# Inform the user with the label

#### This label will comprise:

1/ The level of rolling resistance (from A to G) = tyre contribution to fuel savings

2/ Wet braking level (from A to G)

3 / The external tyre noise level







## **Performance thresholds**

#### Tyres must satisfy **minimum** performance **thresholds** in order to be marketed

#### **Objective**


 Increase road safety, reduce fuel consumption, road traffic noise

#### **Performances concerned**

The 3 performances on the label

#### **Date of application**

• November 2012: new approved tyres







### Other information media for users

# For all tyre categories, the grading information will be present:

- On the manufacturer's promotional technical documentation, including on the Internet
- On/with the tyre sales invoice, given to the purchaser



The user will therefore have the possibility of increasing his/her knowledge about the products and of comparing them in accordance with these criteria.





# **Grading deployment**




The European Parliament approved the text on 25 November 2009

HOWEVER, the test methods for the following 2 performances remain to be officially specified and validated:

- Rolling resistance
- Wet braking

These technical works will take several months, before a full grading will be able to be published by the suppliers in the statutory form.
